Please remember to bring either canned foods or diapers and other children’s goods to donate to the Center and the families they help.



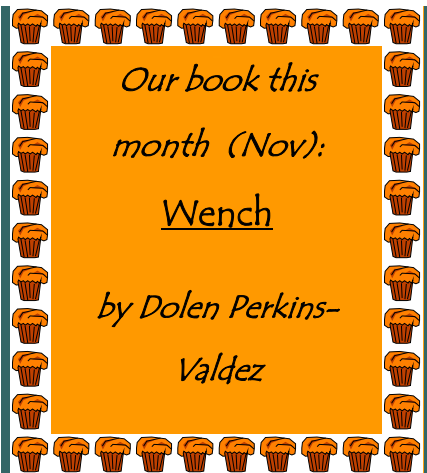
